
Red Willow

Featured Butterfly: The Western
Tiger Swallowtail butterfly has a 3"
wingspan and as a caterpillar eats
leaves of cherry, plum, willow, ash,
alder and oak. Watch for this striking
yellow and black butterfly in the
garden from April through August.

Keystone Plant: This California native is a "must have" (host) plant for caterpillars, which, in turn, are the "must have" food for baby birds.
